



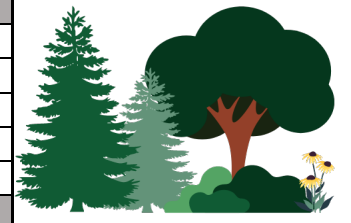

Evergreen

<p><u>Arborvitae, American:</u> <i>Thuja occidentalis</i> - Height of 40 – 50'. Also known as Northern White Cedar. Pyramid shaped tree with flat, soft green scale-like needles. Excellent windbreak tree for home sites. Susceptible to drying out in dry, cold winters so water well.</p>	<p><u>Cedar, Eastern Red:</u> <i>Juniperus virginiana</i> - Height of 40 – 50'. Native to IA. Sharp green scale-like needles. Good for wildlife. Tolerant of most light and heavy soil conditions.</p>	<p><u>Pine, Red:</u> <i>Pinus resinosa</i> – Height of 50 - 80'. Also known as Norway Pine. Long needled, pyramid shaped tree. Prefers well-drained, sandy soils. Popular Christmas tree species. Needs up to 20' spacing to avoid overcrowding of lower branches.</p>	<p><u>Pine, White:</u> <i>Pinus strobus</i> – Height of 80-100'. Fast growing, tallest conifer species in MN. Needles in groups of 5. Pyramid shaped when young, broadening with age. Prefers sandy or silt loam soils, but will tolerate a wide range. Needs at least 20' spacing to avoid overcrowding of lower branches.</p>
<p><u>Spruce, Black Hills:</u> <i>Picea glauca var. densata</i> – Height of 40 – 50'. Native to Black Hills, SD. Strain of white spruce. Slow growing, conical tree with dark green needles. Hardy & more drought resistant than White Spruce.</p>	<p><u>Spruce, Meyer:</u> <i>Picea meyeri</i> - grows to mature heights of 40-100 feet. Being used to replace Colorado Spruce because of it being disease prone. Grows 13-24" per year. Can handle droughty conditions and likes the sun.</p>	<p><u>Spruce, Norway:</u> <i>Picea abies</i> – Height of 80 – 100+'. Native to Europe. Pyramidal tree with drooping branches. Fastest growing, and tallest species of spruce.</p>	

Shrubs

<p><u>Arrowwood:</u> <i>Viburnum dentatum</i> – Height of 6-10'. Native of eastern & mid-western U.S. Produces cream colored flowers followed by small blue or purple fruits. Favors moist but well-drained soils of varying pH. Good food source for wildlife.</p>	<p><u>Cherry, Nanking:</u> <i>Prunus tomentosa</i> - Height 6-10'. Tolerates wind and dry soils. Dense twigs make good screen. Needs full sun. Produces fruit for wildlife.</p>	<p><u>Cranberry, American Highbush:</u> <i>Viburnum trilobum</i> – Height 10 – 16'. Produces white flowers & red edible fruit, with excellent fall color. When planted as a hedge, makes a good snow fence in winter. Good for wildlife. Tolerates a variety of soils.</p>	<p><u>Dogwood, Redosier:</u> <i>Cornus sericea</i> – Height of 8-10'. Fast growing native shrub. This shrub has bright red stems and produces clusters of white fruit. Good for wildlife. Prefers moist sites.</p>
<p><u>Elderberry:</u> <i>Sambucus canadensis</i> - Height of 5-12'. Occurs in rich soils scattered throughout bottom lands, uplands, along streams, fence rows, and low places. Provides fruit for wildlife.</p>	<p><u>Hazelnut, American:</u> <i>Corylus americana</i> - Height of 3-10'. Shade tolerant. Produces edible nuts eaten by birds and mammals. Variable fall color. Can reproduce by suckering.</p>	<p><u>Lilac, Common Purple:</u> <i>Syringa vulgaris</i> - Height of 10-15'. Large, round-headed shrub. Profuse bloomer, with purple flowers in the spring. Prefers well-drained soils and full sun for best flowering effect.</p>	<p><u>Nannyberry:</u> <i>Virburnum lentago</i> - Height of 10-20'. Fast growing. Glossy leaves with cream flowers followed by blue-black berries. Tolerates a wide range of soils and pH. Attractive for shiny foliage and red fall color.</p>

Deciduous Trees

<p><u>Birch, Paper:</u> <i>Betula papyrifera</i> - Height of 50 - 70'. Hardy native and fairly rapid growing with shallow roots. Somewhat borer resistant, but not pollution tolerant. Easy to transplant and casts light shade.</p>	<p><u>Cherry, Black:</u> <i>Prunus serotina</i> - height of 30-60' and moderately fast growing. Prefers well-drained sites. Is moderately tolerant of shade and drought. Produces small fruits in late summer.</p>	<p><u>Chokecherry, Common:</u> <i>Prunus virginiana</i> – Height of 15-20'. Produces edible reddish-purple or black cherries that ripen in late summer. Needs well drained soils. Pruning may be necessary. Excellent for wildlife food & cover.</p>	<p><u>Crabapple, Red Splendor:</u> <i>Malus "red splendor"</i> – Height and spread of 15-25'. Leaves are green or reddish, flowers are white or pink followed by fruits ½" to 1" in diameter. Full sun. Quality food source for wildlife.</p>
<p><u>Hackberry:</u> <i>Celtis occidentalis</i> – Height of 30-60+'. Tall, wide spreading crown. Has scaly or warty bark. Produces dark purple fruit. Grows best in well drained, moist soils. Excellent cover & food source for wildlife. Intermediate shade tolerance.</p>	<p><u>Maple, Red:</u> <i>Acer rubrum</i> – Height 40-70'. Native to MN. Saw toothed lobed leaves. Shade tolerant, grows in very wet to dry conditions, moderately fast growing. Leaves can turn red, yellow or orange in fall.</p>	<p><u>Maple, Sugar:</u> <i>Acer saccharum</i> –Height of 60-80' Produces dense, oval crown and bright fall colors ranging from yellow to orangish red. Slow-growing, needs well-drained, loamy soils. Not tolerant of wet soils. Shade tolerant.</p>	<p><u>Oak, Bur:</u> <i>Quercus macrocarpa</i> – Height of 70-80+'. Has simple lobed leaves and produces acorns. Good for wildlife. Tolerates a variety of soil types. Long-lived but slow growing initially.</p>
<p><u>Oak, Red (Northern):</u> <i>Quercus rubra</i> – Height of 60-80+'. Simple lobed, bristle-tipped leaves. Red or brown fall leaf color. Good for wildlife. Prefers deep, rich soils, intolerant of drier alkaline soils. Long-lived & fastest growing oak.</p>	<p><u>Plum, American:</u> <i>Prunus americana</i> – Height of 12-25'. Fast growing small tree. Fragrant white flowers are followed by edible fruits, yellow or red in color. Quite adaptable. Thicket forming.</p>	<p><u>Poplar, Norway:</u> <i>Populus deltoides x nigra</i> – Height up to 80+'. Grows very fast and tall. Good for windbreaks when used as a temporary species. Short lived. Norway is best adapted of the poplar species.</p>	<p><u>Serviceberry: (Juneberry)</u> small tree 6-15 ft. Expands by suckers. Prefers loam - sandy loam with high organic matter. Limited drought tolerance. Will not sustain in ponded conditions. Full/partial sun.</p>

Plant Packs

<p><u>Walnut, Black:</u> <i>Juglans nigra</i> – Height of 50-60+'. Native to IA. Fast growing. Leaves are pinnately compound and produce a hard-shelled nut. Good for wildlife. Prefers moist well-drained soils.</p>	<p><u>Willow, Hybrid:</u> <i>Salix matsudana/alba</i> - Large tree up to 75'. Single stemmed tree good for windbreaks. Avoid planting near other willows and in areas where uncontrolled spread is possible.</p>	<p><u>Monarch Pack:</u> A mix of native species to benefit Monarch caterpillars and butterflies. Species include Showy Milkweed, Meadow Blazing Star, Showy Goldenrod, Sky Blue Aster, Purple Prairie Clover, and Side Oats Grama.</p>	<p><u>Pollinator Pack:</u> A mix of Spring, Summer, and Fall blossoming species in a variety of colors to provide food for a range of pollinators year-round. Species include Yarrow, Prairie Coreopsis, Pale Purple Coneflower, Sky Blue Aster, Hoary Vervain, and Little Bluesteam.</p>
